What more do we need other than to know these truths and ask for opportunities to walk out in them? On this the apostle Paul wrote:

"Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen".

I wish you all our readers a very Happy Christmas, a blessed New Year when it comes, and many exciting "God moments" over the festive period!

Spotlight on Helen and Mick Goldspink and family (Kiltarlity) - "THE ROLLER COASTER LIFE"

Not everyone describes their life as the biggest roller coaster you can imagine. WE do! Life for everyone has ups and downs, highs and lows - that's normal. We even had. God only gives you what he knows you can cope with. We heard it all. People didn't really understand what was going on in our lives. Why should they? In every family the natural cycle is of births, deaths and marriages. We are no different. We dealt with the illness and

subsequent death of parents, the marriages and divorce of siblings and the births of nieces, nephews and cousins.



The reason describing our lives us a "roller-coaster" was that something happened in the family that resulted in the Christian faith that was so key to our family, appearing to abandon us. Why? We hear you ask. To answer that we need to give you some family background and then maybe you will understand.

We have been married for forty four years. We have two children, Annika whom you know and Brian who sadly you will never know. Brian was our first child. When he was almost five he was diagnosed with Cystic Fibrosis. The prognosis at that time was not good, he would not live to seven. They didn't know Brian! He took great pleasure in proving doctors wrong, and WRONG he proved them. His life and ours revolved around

physio, hospital appointments, hospital admissions due to infections, medication, and operations. Brian, despite all this, lived life to the full. We always felt supported by the Church we attended, together with family and close friends although maybe they couldn't understand completely the impact the diagnosis had on all our lives, including Annika. At times life was very difficult for us all and that was when we really felt the presence of God.

We are immensely proud of both our children and their achievements. Both are vey musical and both succeeded in their chosen careers. Annika, as you know, is a paediatric nurse and Brian was a piano / percussion teacher.

We moved to Muir of Ord in January 2010. It was very hard to leave Annika and Brian but they were both settled by then. Brian was married by then to Claire and no longer living at home. It was the right time for us. It had been a dream of ours. Brian and Annika knew that and were worried but happy for us. Mick had a massive heart attack shortly after being made redundant from his job in the city for the second time. I had been diagnosed with cancer and had major surgery. I also felt it was time for me to retire from teaching.

We found the Methodist Church in Inverness but found it very difficult to settle there. Everything went wrong. In 2013 Nick's Mum, who only three months before had left her family in Sussex to be with Nick, died at the age of eighty, in February. Exactly one month later, at the end of March, Brian died. We did not get to the hospital in time despite all our efforts. He

was ten days short of his thirty seventh birthday. Our world fell apart. The God that seemed to have been with us all our lives suddenly seemed to have abandoned us. That was how it felt.

Nick and Annika married at Kiltarlity in August. It was a wonderful day, although tinged with sadness. Hilda and Brian were remembered in the service by a poem written by Hilda and a song written by Brian.


After the wedding we came to Church in Kiltarlity a few times. The more we came, the feeling that God was with us began to return. During one particular service there was the overwhelming feeling that we were not alone and never had been. God had always been there, we just needed to ask for His help. We did.

The Church Family at Kiltarlity have been a great support, without you knowing the whole story. We describe the feeling, when among you, as being given a great hug by a father. We are so happy and settled with you all. It's a feeling we have not felt for many many years. I hope you all realise how special you are.

Now we have Eliza, such a darling wee girl. How you have all shown such a great interest in her is wonderful. She has changed from the tiny baby who was quiet during the service to a toddler who at times can be quite vocal! You miss her when she is not in Church. You ask about her. You CARE. Her baptism was a special day in so many ways. God was truly among us that day and every day. The fact that members of the Church Family

joined with us after the service meant a great deal to us all. Many of our family and friends were really touched by the warmth of your welcome and by Jonathan's service. The roller coaster is slowing. It bumps every now and again. However, we are no longer lost and alone. We know who to turn to. You helped in that. Thank you from the bottom of our hearts.


Our organist will once again be hosting a concert, this time in Kiltarlity Church Friday 20th January 2017, at 6.30 pm. Artistes will include:


- Tonya's students

FINANCIAL REVIEW KIRKHILL

One of the constant topics on the agenda of the Deacon's Court (now Property & Finance Committee) is Church Finances. Each time the Deacon's Court meets a review of income and expenditure is undertaken for the year to date and that is compared with the position in the previous year and against the budget.





The figures to 30th of September 2016 showed that income was fairly static against the same period last year but down against budget. Income from standing orders (SOs) & envelopes was up 37% whereas as the open plate giving was down by 34%. The immediate conclusion would be that one has been replaced by the other but the number of people giving by SO & envelope has remained fairly static, so the reality is that the giving by that method has increased whereas the giving to the open plate has decreased.

The graphs show the pattern of giving since January 2014. The spikes on the second graph arise because some giving is made quarterly. We are expecting our Ministry & Mission cost to rise by 20%. This is the amount we pay to Edinburgh, being our share of the cost of ministry throughout the whole of Scotland. The amount bears no relation to the amount our minister is paid and is a proportional share of all ministry costs. The large increase has come about because, unbeknown to the Deacon's Court, our share had been discounted because of the cost incurred when we refurbished the Church. This year it is simply being returned to where it should be.

The obvious answer would be for the Deacon's Court to ask you to give more but I am sure many of you would find that impertinent. Certainly it is good from time to time to consider ones financial position in relation to your church giving but what we are asking is for you to consider giving on a regular basis, either by SO or weekly envelopes. If that is something that is of interest to you please speak to Louise Monaghan in Kirkhill &

Ian Morrison in Kiltarlity and they will give you the necessary forms to complete.



A further way to increase church income is by gift aiding your offering. If you are a tax payer all that it requires is for you to complete and sign a form confirming that you are a tax

payer and your treasurer will take care of the rest. For every £100 you give to the church HMRC will refund the church £25. Speak to Louise or Ian and they will get the necessary form for you to complete.
