
One thing I am noticing as we emerge from the various and prolonged restrictions is that we are all a bit more cautious. What I mean by that is that we are more cautious as we contemplate additions to our 'new' routine. Rightly so. In my opinion, people are much more intentional about what they pick up, take on, or choose to become involved in. There is wisdom in this. We have never been more aware of our fragility - mentally, physically, spiritually - than we are just now, in all likelihood. We have

experienced change on an unprecedented scale for this generation and the change keeps coming in many spheres of life. The great thing about change is that it also highlights the elements of life that do not change. There are things of course that do not change. Hebrews 13.8 reminds us that Jesus is the same yesterday, today and forever. Psalm 139.7 points out that there is no place we can go where we will not find His presence or His Spirit. His forgiveness and His love are both constant. We cannot be separated from the love of God, Romans 8.38-39 points out. He is our Rock and our Anchor. Rocks don't generally move and anchors keep us grounded or secure in place and both in my opinion are good things. With all the change we have seen and will continue to see the more we are likely to respond by reaching out for things that are rightly and intentionally constant for our own good and keep us rooted. So, when things begin to pick up a bit and you may be feeling as though a wave is about to swamp you, be sure and make time, take time to anchor and root yourself. One of the most powerful and helpful verses in the Bible I find is Psalm 46.10 Be still and know that I am God. It is not rocket science - just stop, breathe and ask God to make himself known. He will and you will be better off for knowing that you are His, that He created you, that He loves you, that He is for you, that He will strengthen you and lead you.

So, as we would say in Canada, keep your head up and your stick on the ice. This is an ice hockey reference - 'keep your head up' so you are alert and ready and so you don't get body checked into next week and 'keep your stick on the ice' so you are able to take

a pass, shoot or trip an opposing player. The last one is a penalty by the way and will get you two minutes in the 'sin bin'. You see it is a very religious sport!
