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A word from our Minister.....

Last year when I wrote my bit for the winter edition of the newsletter, we were unaware of the impending arrival of more covid restrictions. We managed to get one nativity service done only to have to cancel the second. It all seems like a distant memory now. The reality is we can never predict with any accuracy the future that awaits. With Remembrance Sunday just behind us we were all thinking about the changes that have taken place with the invasion of Ukraine by Russia. Again, would we have been able to predict the impact that conflict has had and will continue to have? Rising costs of living, interest rates, climbing energy bills and more displaced people. The last four years have been difficult on many physically, mentally, emotionally, fronts: financially. spiritually. The list goes on. The Kirk too faces great challenge and change as well and even the most positive of optimists would have to concede that life is likely to become more challenging before it gets it bit easier. Yet the hope of the Christmas message is again this year unchanging. Last year I directed readers to read through the book of the prophet Isaiah. (Bringing the Bible to life for every child in every primary school)

Open the Book is a project which offers primary school children an opportunity to hear the major stories of the Bible during the school year. It is presented in schools by teams of Christians from local churches and using the Lion Storyteller Bible.

After a lengthy absence from Tomnacross Primary School in Kiltarlity due to the Covid epidemic and lockdown, it is both an honour and delight to have been once again made most welcome by staff and pupils. The children of P1-3 have responded enthusiastically to those stories so far presented and it is hoped that periodically older children too may be included. Our team of volunteers try to bring the stories to life, using visual aids, costume, and drama. Teachers at all times accompany the classes, sometimes joining in. Project Trust

Hi! My name's Isobel Garvie and I'm currently in S6 at Charleston Academy. I'm studying Advanced Higher Biology, Chemistry and Maths and I'll be studying Biomedical Science at university after my gap year.

Next year I'll be going on my gap year to Senegal with the charity Project Trust. During my year away I'll be living in a local community with a fellow Project Trust volunteer and together we will be teaching young children. In addition, I will be fully immersed in the community and so will be getting involved with all sorts of activities, from dance classes to football celebrations. I'm extremely excited to go to Senegal as I've never been to Africa before, let alone Senegal. As Google shows me, Senegal is full of gorgeous landscapes and the one that stands out the most for me is Lake Retba (The Pink Lake shown below).



The two official languages that I'll be speaking are French and Wolof. I'm looking forward to building on my Higher French but am also very excited to learn Wolof, although I believe it'll be quite tricky as it has a completely different alphabet!

I chose to go to Senegal because of the languages but also because I believe it'll be an incredibly enriching experience which will teach me huge amounts. I'll not only be learning languages but also Senegalese traditions, food, culture, sports and much more. The national food of Senegal is Thieboudienne which is a fish and rice dish - unfortunately fish is not high up on my favourite foods list, but I guess that's something else I'll learn when I'm out there!

On the other hand, living in Senegal will be very tricky as well as rewarding. I'll be away from home and everyone I know for a whole 12 months. I won't find out my exact location in Senegal until May, but it is very possible that I won't have access to WiFi, phone service and running water. This will mean it's even harder to stay in contact with family and friends, but I reckon old-fashioned letters will suffice! Everyone I've spoken to has said that it was one of the most challenging yet rewarding years of their life. I believe this will be similar for me because all of the basic amenities I've taken for granted my whole life will most likely not be as accessible.

In order to fund this incredible opportunity, I have to raise \pounds 6,950 between now and August 2023. I hope to raise this sum of money by holding fundraising events throughout the year such as:

Although one of my main intentions of this trip is to contribute to the local community and also learn huge amounts, I realise I will also personally benefit. Therefore, I have already contributed £1,000 from my savings to start the fundraising and I am donating 90% of my earnings monthly.

The money I raise will go towards paying for my training, flights, accommodation, but also the in-country support I will receive from Project Trust to ensure my safety in Senegal. I hope these things will ultimately allow me to make a small difference in the local community. "Whose we are and whom we serve".

We held the first Guild meeting for some time on Wednesday 5^{th} October '22 at Kirkhill - the meeting was opened by the Reverend Drew Kuzma. The intention was to begin with some informal sessions in Kirkhill & Kiltarlity, until everyone's thoughts are carefully considered. Since advertising the Guild's start up again, the Beauly congregation is now joining us and there has been a name change to "The Firth Of Beauly", to accommodate this.

The objective was to have a Guild that is accessible, enjoyable, interesting, and thought provoking for all. This will be done in accordance with the aims of the Guild whilst operating within the guidelines of the Church of Scotland's "Guild Constitution" with the agreement of the two Ministers, Rev Drew Kuzma and Rev Ian Manson from the Beauly Church of Scotland, and Kirk Sessions. Nonetheless it is not there to restrict or limit our performance and achievement or equally how we do it, acknowledging flexability to express and demonstrate our experiences in terms of peoples' location and existing resourses. The only traditions we need to continue are those incorporated in the Guilds aims and motto.

The Guild may reflect different interests and age groups: be led and organised in different ways. Perhaps even more than one group meeting arranged at different times of day or at different times of year, as a result allowing a group to adapt, shape, adjust and individualise it as their own.

The local group is where most of the Guild's work will be undertaken and where its connections and friendships mature and flourish, additionally it is a regional and national movement which allows for involvement and support for one another.

The work of local activies - regional and national - is brought together by the three-yearly strategy 2021 - 2024 with yearly themes, this year's theme being "Wee seeds, Big Trees". All six of the current projects are supported by the Guild members and relate to the theme, and are described below:

- <u>Beat</u>: Blether with Beat, supporting people living with an eating disorder and raising community awareness.
- <u>Home for good</u>: Finding a home for every child, supporting the Christians to be involved in adoption and fostering.
- <u>Pioneers</u>: Chocolate Heaven, supporting the developmenty of sustainable chocolate production in South East Asia.

- <u>Starchild</u>: Finding the light in every child, supporting children with autism and other learning disabilities in Uganda.
- <u>Unida</u>: Hear our voice, supporting and empowering women in Brazil through theological education.
- <u>The Vine trust</u>: Kazunza village of hope, supporting the development of sustainable village in Tanzania.

The Guild has supported projects and raised more than $\pounds7$ million since the 1960's.

For the Guild to qualify and function as a national movement members are required to contribute a small annual fee, which is set by the National Executive and payable yearly.


